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CONTAINER'S FOR CHANGE TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO LOCAL CLUBS AND NOT-FOR-PROFITS

The success story of Containers for Change in Exmouth began on 1 October. Record numbers of 30,000 to 50,000 containers that are recycled on a Saturday morning are well above the average of neighbouring towns of Carnarvon and Meekatharra.

In the first six months, Exmouth residents recycled more than 550,000 containers - outside of the town's "busy" season. All of these eligible containers are saved from ending up in landfill or left by the side of the road.

Now, just before Easter, the programme is being rolled out to more volunteers by the Freemasons, who applied to become a registered mobile point. They are being supported by the Shire of Exmouth in organising and communicating the extended volunteer programme.

The Shire of Exmouth strongly encourages local clubs and not-for-profit organisations (NPOs) to register and support the recycling initiative while raising funds for their organisation and becoming more self-sustaining.
